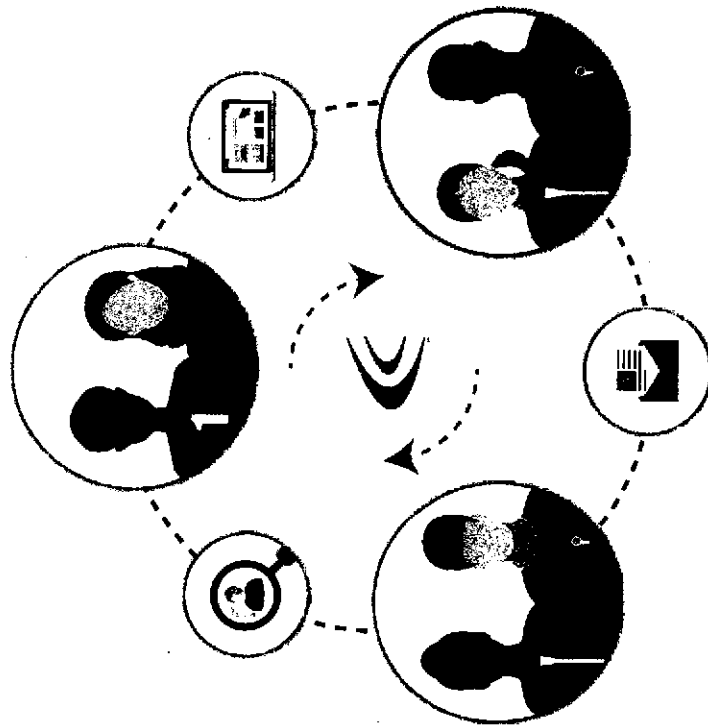

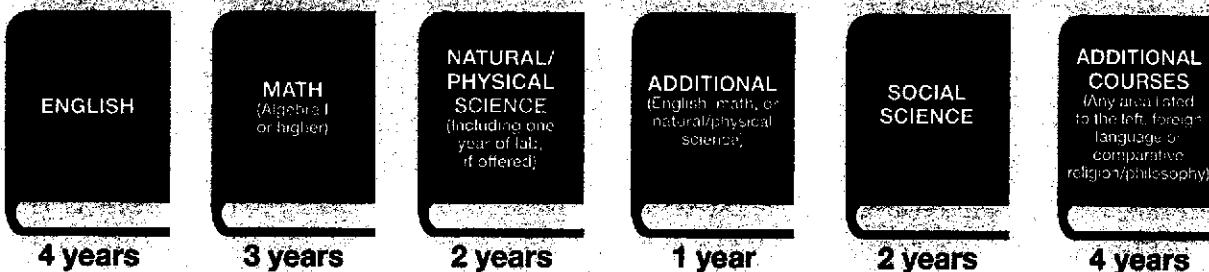

DIVISION I ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

College-bound student-athletes will need to meet the following academic requirements to practice, receive athletics scholarships, and/or compete during their first year.

Core-Course Requirement

Complete 16 core courses in the following areas:



Full Qualifier

- Complete 16 core courses.
 - Ten of the 16 core courses must be completed before the seventh semester (senior year) of high school.
 - Seven of the 10 core courses must be in English, math or natural/physical science.
- Earn a core-course GPA of at least 2.300.
- Earn the ACT/SAT score matching your core-course GPA on the Division I sliding scale (see back page).
- Graduate high school.

Academic Redshirt

- Complete 16 core courses.
- Earn a core-course GPA of at least 2.000.
- Earn the ACT/SAT score matching your core-course GPA on the Division I sliding scale (see back page).
- Graduate high school.

Full Qualifier:

College-bound student-athletes may practice, compete and receive athletics scholarships during their first year of enrollment at an NCAA Division I school.

Academic Redshirt:

College-bound student-athletes may receive athletics scholarships during their first year of enrollment and may practice during their first regular academic term, but may NOT compete during their first year of enrollment.

Nonqualifier:

College-bound student-athletes cannot practice, receive athletics scholarships or compete during their first year of enrollment at an NCAA Division I school.

2018 DIVISION II NEW ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

College-bound student-athletes first enrolling at an NCAA Division II school on or after Aug. 1, 2018, need to meet new academic rules to practice, compete and receive athletics scholarships during their first year.

Core-Course Requirement

Complete 16 core courses in the following areas:

Full Qualifier

- Complete 16 core courses.
- Earn a core-course GPA of at least 2.200.
- Earn the ACT/SAT score matching your core-course GPA on the Division II full qualifier sliding scale (see back page).
- Graduate high school.

Partial Qualifier

- Complete 16 core courses.
- Earn a core-course GPA of at least 2.000.
- Earn the ACT/SAT score matching your core-course GPA on the Division II partial qualifier sliding scale (see back page).
- Graduate high school.

Full Qualifier:

College-bound student-athletes may practice, compete and receive athletics scholarships during their first year of enrollment at an NCAA Division II school.

Partial Qualifier:

College-bound student-athletes may receive athletics scholarships during their first year of enrollment and may practice during their first regular academic term, but may NOT compete during their first year of enrollment.

Nonqualifier:

College-bound student-athletes may not practice, compete or receive athletics scholarships during their first year of enrollment at an NCAA Division II school.

NCAA FAQ's

What are the qualifications?

The minimum GPA you can have and still be NCAA eligible for DI is a 2.3 GPA and a 900 SAT or 75 ACT sum score. You will need a 2.20 GPA and a 840 SAT or 70 ACT sum score to be eligible at the Division II level. Ultimately, the minimum GPA you will need is dependent on where you fall on the NCAA sliding scale.

NCAA Sliding Scale

It helps determine the SAT/ACT test scores you need to be eligible. It is based on your GPA.

Can Scholarships Be Rescinded

An athletic scholarship cannot be guaranteed for four years.

NCAA institutions offer one-year college scholarships that can be renewable annually. At the end of each year, athletics-based aid may be canceled or reduced for any reason.

What does a full scholarship cover?

Full scholarships cover tuition and fees, room, board and course-related books. Most student-athletes who receive athletics scholarships receive an amount covering a portion of these costs.

In most cases, coaches decide who receives a scholarship, the scholarship amount and whether it will be renewed. Fewer than 20,000 students per year will earn a private full-ride scholarship award - that may sound like a lot, but consider that over 20 million students are expected to attend college this fall (so about 0.1% of students, or one in 1000, get full-ride scholarships).



Frequently Asked Questions

What are NAIA eligibility requirements?

To be deemed eligible for participation in NAIA sports, an athlete must achieve a minimum score of 860 on the SAT, a minimum of 18 on the ACT, finish in the top half of his graduating class, and maintain a GPA of 2.00. By satisfying any two of these requirements, an athlete will be deemed eligible to play in the NAIA.

What is the NAIA Eligibility Center?

The NAIA Eligibility Center will provide qualified seniors with an eligibility decision before graduation if they meet or exceed the following criteria: They must have completed their junior year of high school. They need to have at least a 3.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale, or a 2.5 GPA on a 4.0 scale midway through senior year. The link to the eligibility center is <https://play.mynaia.org>. The cost is \$80 for the initial registration.

How long does it take to get cleared by NAIA?

How long will it take for my records to be processed? Once documents arrive at the NAIA Eligibility Center, they are scanned and placed under review. It will generally take 3-4 days to complete this process.

Can NAIA give full ride scholarships?

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) offers scholarships on both the Division I and Division II level. Division III level sports do not offer scholarship funding. ... There are limits on the total amount of financial it can award as full or partial grants to students in that sport.

Is NAIA better than Division 3? D3 vs. NAIA

Lower academic standards for athletes in NAIA allows helps NAIA get more D1 ability players. Comparing D2 and NAIA would be a better comparison as head to head it is close each year between them. NAIA has a lot less teams than other division's so it makes it harder to compare.

Can NAIA pay for visits?

There is no limit to the number of official visits you can take to Division III, NAIA or JUCO schools, though you can only take one visit per school. During an unofficial visit a coach can provide you tickets to 3 home sporting events that are under \$100-you can also view practices. Unofficial visits are visits that prospects finance themselves. An unofficial visit might be very official in that it might have a set itinerary, be for multiple days, or be a very important part of a prospect's recruitment. Prospects make take an unofficial visit at any age or grade level.



NCAA vs. NAIA

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), are two separate governing bodies of college athletics.

NCAA

Around 1200 schools.

It consists of three divisions (Division I, II, and III)

Oversees 23 sports.

Divisions I and II both offer athletic scholarships, with over 126,000 student-athletes receiving partial or full athletic scholarships.

Division III student-athletes can only receive academic or non-athletic scholarships – no athletic scholarships are allowed.

Each year, the NCAA hands out about \$1 billion in athletic scholarships, with the rest coming from the individual school.

NAIA

Consists of 300 schools and 13 sports.

60,000 students.

It includes two divisions (Division I and II) and Division I in the NAIA is comparable to Division II in the NCAA.

Over 90% of schools in the NAIA offer scholarships,

NAIA athletes receive an average of \$7,000 of financial aid.

It is impossible to say how many athletes receive scholarships because the NAIA does not have a central database like the NCAA.
